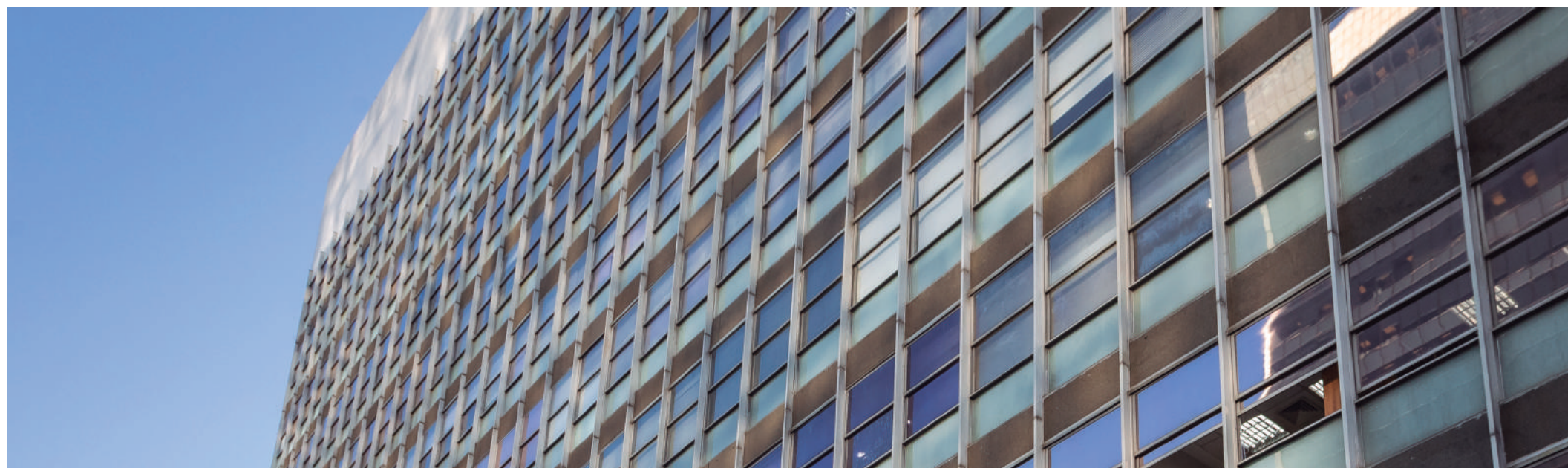

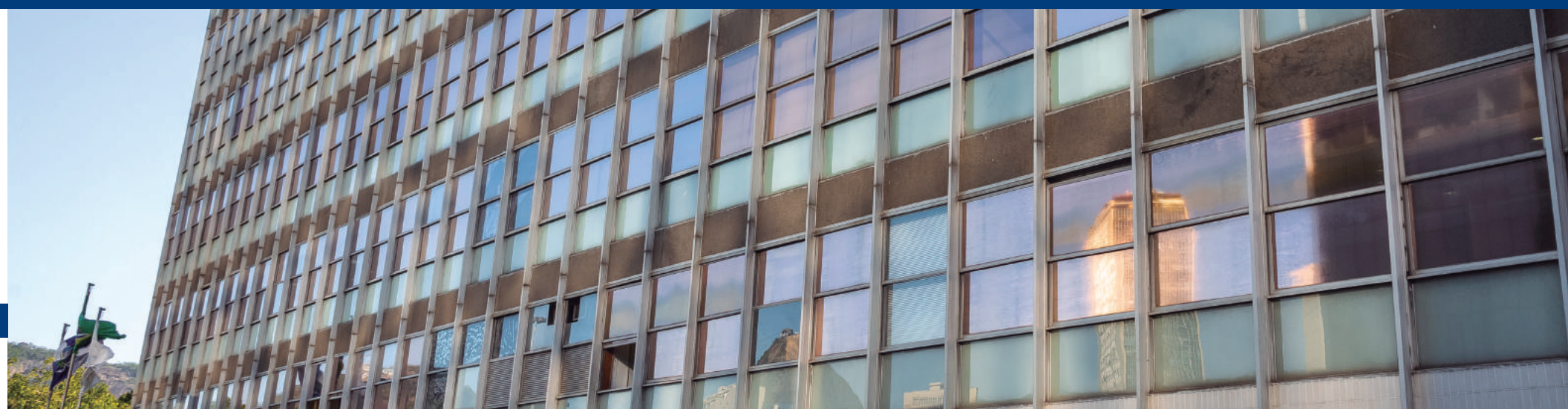

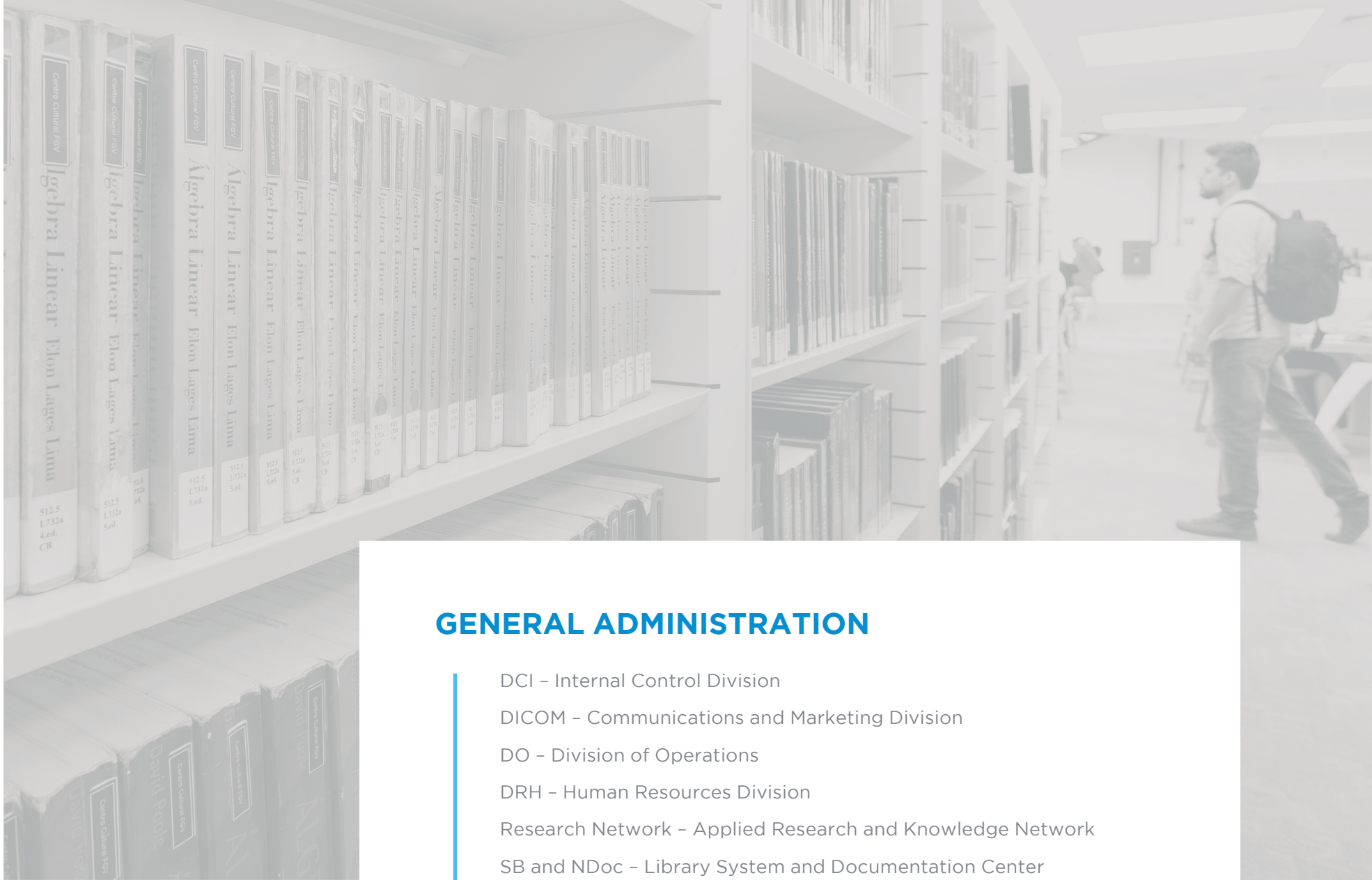

# CPDOC

## SCHOOL OF SOCIAL SCIENCES

Dean: Celso Castro



Pioneering efforts to make access to historical documents available to everyone, providing free access to its collection, including via the internet.

**The School of Social Sciences** was spun out of the Center for Research and Documentation in Contemporary Brazilian History (CPDOC) 45 years ago, with the goal of safeguarding and producing valuable documentary sources for the country's history. The personal archives of former Brazilian president Getúlio Vargas were donated to CPDOC in 1973, and they were the first of more than 200 sets of private archives of important figures in Brazilian contemporary history donated to the center. The collection of approximately 2 million text and audiovisual records tells the political, economic, social and cultural story of Brazil, as well as describing the country's positioning on the world stage. CPDOC became the School of Social Sciences after incorporating educational activities into its scope in the 2000s.

The school offers bachelor's degrees in the social sciences, as well as graduate programs, specialized courses and MBAs. It came third place overall in the latest General Course Index (IGC) ranking produced by the Brazilian Education Ministry.

## RIO DE JANEIRO LAW SCHOOL

**The Rio de Janeiro Law School was** established in 2002 in response to the market's demand for professionals trained to apply law in practice, seeking legal solutions to the everyday problems of Brazilian society. Since then, the school's activities have been divided between teaching and research, based on four main pillars: legislative action, social engagement, international activities and innovation.

The school operates in multiple areas, offering undergraduate, graduate and continuing education courses and running research centers focused on issues related to judicial reform, technology, economics and the environment. The school is a leader in public sector legal careers and business law. It has its own virtual library and it publishes articles that address law in a multidisciplinary manner.

## SAO PAULO LAW SCHOOL

**Created to train** a new generation of legal experts qualified to overcome the challenging demands of modern society, the Sao Paulo Law School has an innovative educational approach, preparing its students to work in the public and private sectors through constant dialogue with other fields of knowledge.

The school offers undergraduate, academic master's, PhD, professional master's and non-degree graduate programs in more than 10 areas, most notably business, tax and labor law.

The school's undergraduate course came top out of all private sector institutions in the latest Folha University Ranking (RUF) and it was given five stars in recent editions of Editora Abril Students' Guide.

When it comes to knowledge production, as well as its research centers and groups, the school stands out for its Coordination for Applied Legal Research (CPJA), a unit created to help solve the most pressing issues of Brazilian society by conducting research projects in constant interaction with the public and private sectors.

**Established in 1954**, EAESP is recognized as a world-class business administration research center, training leaders in the business, government and academic fields. The school has supported the industrialization and development of Brazilian companies ever since its inception, and it now trains professionals capable of tackling the challenges of today's globalized and ever-changing world.

The school offers undergraduate courses in business administration and public administration, executive training courses, master's degrees and PhD programs. One of the school's courses is OneMBA, considered the best executive MBA in Latin America in the Financial Times' latest ranking.

- It is one of a handful of business schools in the world and the first in Brazil to receive triple international accreditation, from the Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business (AACSB), European Foundation for Management Development (EFMD), and Association of MBAs (AMBA).
- It is the most international school in Latin America, with more than 100 partnerships with internationally renowned institutions on all continents. Some courses are run entirely in English.

**EMAp was founded in 2011** with the aim of offering an undergraduate course in applied mathematics to train professionals capable of tackling real-life issues that require studies of mathematical models to solve them.

In addition to core pure mathematics subjects, such as mathematical analysis, the course curriculum covers statistics, probability, optimization and programming, among other topics, which are not normally taught in undergraduate mathematics or engineering courses.

The school's research areas are Data Science, Optimization and Control Theory, Statistics, Stochastic Methods, Quantitative Finance and Mathematical Epidemiology.

EMAp also offers an undergraduate course in data science and it has master's and PhD programs in its areas of research.

The Provost Office's objective is to oversee FGV's schools in terms of subjects related to regulation, academic management and the use of new technologies, besides keeping the institution's senior management up to date on domestic and international regulatory demands in the areas of teaching, research and graduate education, which are continually changing. It also promotes synergies between schools and their researchers, especially through network programs.

## RESEARCH NETWORK

### Applied Research and Knowledge Network

Director: Goret Pereira Paulo

Driven by the strategic goal of promoting research with excellence and innovation, FGV created the Applied Research and Knowledge Network in 2016. The area's goals are to bring together public and private sector researchers to carry out research projects that can yield significant benefits for society, connect researchers and encourage the formation of research networks in Brazil and abroad, and help disseminate the knowledge produced by FGV's schools and applied research centers, thereby strengthening the institution's mission.

## SB and NDOc

### Library System and Documentation Center

Director: Marieta de Moraes Ferreira

FGV's Library System was created in 2012 with the main goal of promoting integration, modernization and innovation with respect to FGV's libraries, as well as synergies between them and the institution's schools and units, focusing on forming and improving academic archives.

The Library System also works continually to create policies to facilitate the bibliographic research of researchers and students, while enhancing and expanding FGV's academic production and records. The Institutional Repository is the main vehicle for FGV's academic production. It plays a key role in raising the foundation's visibility and encouraging scientific communication between researchers and professors.

The system encompasses the Mario Henrique Simonsen Library (BMHS) in Rio de Janeiro, the Karl A. Boedecker Library (BKAB) in Sao Paulo, the Brasília Library, the Digital Library, and the Documentation Center (NDOc).

Created originally in the 1960s as the FGV Central Archives, the Documentation Center has been part of the Library System since 2009. Its mission is to supply the institution with documentary information needed for the full performance of its activities. NDOc has teams in Rio de Janeiro and Sao Paulo.

## CHAMBER

### Chamber FGV of Mediation & Arbitration

Director: Julian Chacel

FGV created its Chamber of Arbitration following the enactment of Brazilian Law 9,307 of 1996, which regulated institutional arbitration in Brazil. Its main function is to manage and monitor arbitration proceedings, ensuring that all deadlines and phases are executed in accordance with the law. The mediation phase can precede arbitration and, if the agreement is accepted by the parties, there is no need for arbitration.

It should be stressed that arbitration courts do not judge. They may only be convened when the parties decide to do so.

The chamber is presided over by FGV's president and it has two directors, as well as a president of the Arbitration Commission, as provided for in regulations. There is also a permanent panel of arbitrators made up of people with recognized technical qualifications and a spotless reputation, as well as professors from FGV's schools in the fields of law, economics and administration.

CDMC was created in 2017, to identify talented young people who won medals at the Brazilian Public School Mathematical Olympiads and other national Olympiads, coming from public schools across Brazil, especially non-selective ones. The purpose of the center is to encourage these students to pursue undergraduate and graduate studies at FGV, thereby helping to supply the trained scientists and professionals that the country needs.

The center also maps non-selective public schools of excellence, based on their performance in Brazilian Education Ministry assessments and knowledge Olympiads, in order to help train their teachers, enhance their management systems and better prepare their students.

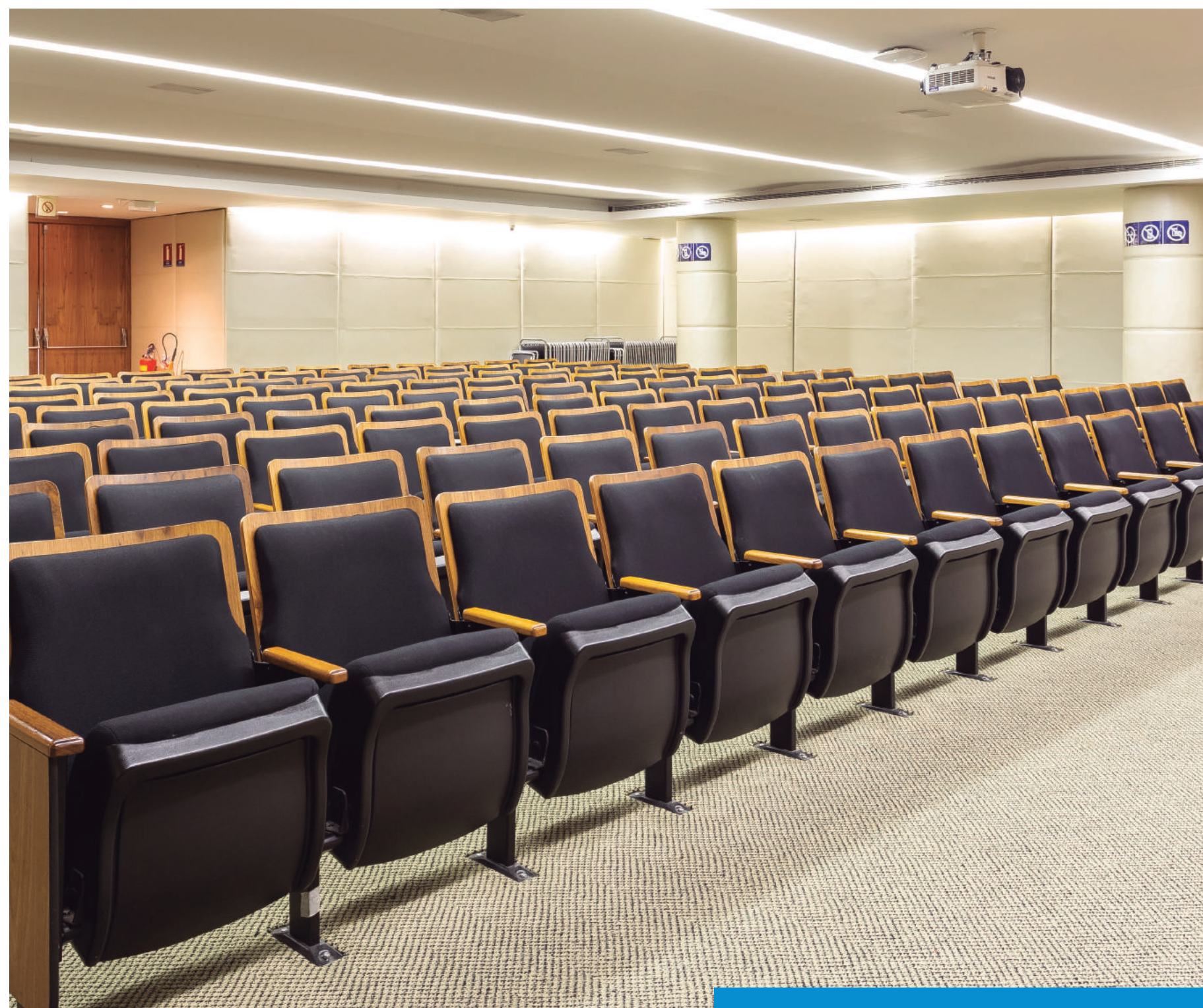
